A Freight Wreck.

On the C., A. & C. Road Causes Serious Injury to a Tramp

Sunbury, O., March 31. – Freight train No. 13, due here at 7:35 was badly wrecked at Galena, two miles south of here last night. Just after the train had crossed the half-mile trestle the trucks under the front end of one of the box cars dropped down and caused the car to crash into two others. The flat car was entirely demolished. The other cars were badly smashed up and one of them can hardly be repaired.

Detective Martin arrested two of the four hobos on board. A third one of the gang escaped. The fourth was found lying under the wreckage of the flat car seriously bruised. He was attended by the local physician and removed to the Woodmen hall. He stated that his name was Andrew Lyberger, and his home New York City, but refused to answer any other questions. The wreck train was called for and removed the wreckage before morning.
