The engine is one of a lot of old ones which have been in use on this division and it has now been sent to the shops for repairs. The cause of the explosion has not been clearly defined.

N. & W. Engine Explodes.

(Portsmouth Times, August 2, 1898)

Master mechanic Cullinan was in Columbus yesterday to inspect engine 554, which blew up Sunday night at Valley Crossing. The engine was in charge of engineer Ed. Strain and was pulling a west-bound fast freight from Norfolk. The engine exploded right at the crossing and was blown to pieces. The wreck will be taken to Roanoke to be rebuilt. Neither the engineer nor his fireman were hurt.
